



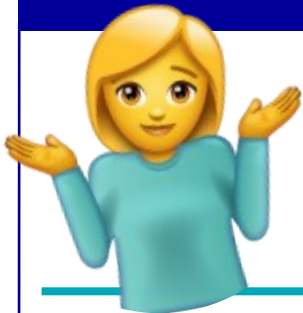

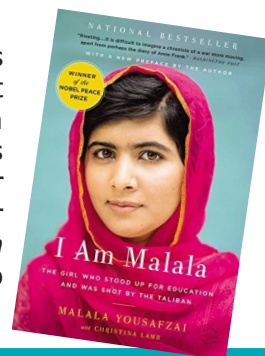


## She wasn't a reader, but ...

One of our long-time inmate participants — we'll call him Robert — has two children and two step-children. The first time our facilitator met Robert he chose books for three of the children but said his fifteen year-old step-daughter wasn't a reader. The facilitator suggested that, although the teen has not enjoyed reading in the past, she might be disappointed if the other three siblings received mail and she did not — so Robert chose a book from our young adult book cart to send.

Apparently, the books Robert has sent to his step-daughter over several months have been well received. He reported to our facilitator that she now has a bookcase in her room for her book collection. And recently, when she was shopping with her family, she asked to stop at a bookstore to look for more.

**Remain in Touch** not only has introduced her to reading but strengthened the bond between her and her step dad. She has also looked to Robert for suggestions on what to read for a school book report. *I Am Malala* is the book that came to the rescue.



## Reading Aloud

Reading aloud is one of the most important things parents can do with their children. Reading aloud builds many important foundational skills, introduces vocabulary, provides a model of fluent, expressive reading, and helps children recognize what reading for pleasure is all about.

## It's all in the bookmark

As reported in our last newsletter, **Remain in Touch** has become creative in serving incarcerated parents when access to the jails is temporarily disrupted. If inmates are not able to record readings or greetings with our facilitators, they may still select books for us to send to their children. To aid in the selection process, we have provided booklists for every age group featuring color images of the book covers and descriptions of the content.

We provide forms for the inmates on which they write the name of the book and the child to whom it should be sent. Included on the form is a rectangular space to write a personal message. Remain in Touch receives the

previewed form from the jail administrator, and then laminates the parent's hand-written message — making it into a bookmark. The bookmark is placed in the book that is mailed to the child. Here is a sampling of some of the messages:

"I love you the mostest!"

"Our little genius ... A book to take camping"

"I am so proud of you sounding out your words and learning to spell. Keep up the greatness and know I love you so much!"

"I love you to the moon and back."

"I love you with all of my soul, heart, mind! So glad you love reading! Enjoy everything. Absorb everything."

"This is the book that got me reading when I was younger, give it a chance and I think you'd love it. I love you buddy."

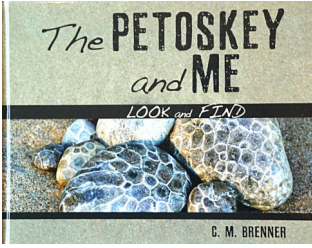
"I love you so much baby girl, Daddy will be home soon, Merry Christmas, take care of Mommy for me."

- Children develop literacy skills long before they read.
- Young children who are read to regularly have a larger vocabulary, a stronger foundation of language awareness, and literacy skills at a younger age.
- Children who are read to regularly by family members experience social-emotional gains and an increased likelihood of overall school success.

**Local books, local bookstores, local treasures**

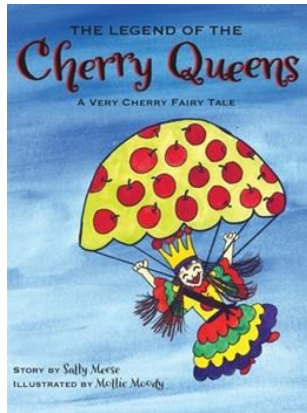
